Meet two of our learners who share their 2022 Milestone Projects.


Ava Gaddum, YEAR 9 QUEST PROJECT "Korowai Aroha – Cloaked in Love"

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

The Real Guide to New Zealand

Can you tell a skink from a gecko? Is that a kea or a kākā? Can you spot the difference between a northern rātā and a pōhutukawa? New book The Real Guide to New Zealand is designed to help readers gain a basic understanding of the natural history of Aotearoa. written by Ōākura resident



Mark Danenhauer, it explains why and how NZ's natural world is unique and how people have impacted on it.

What prompted you to write this book?

I have loved nature for my entire adult life and have been fortunate enough to travel throughout the world and experience a lot of amazing places. For years I've been passionate about protecting the natural world and educating others about it. While living in the

United States I wrote a book, Jake's Nature Guide: Rocky Mountains, that introduces the reader to all aspects of the Rockies. Upon arrival in New Zealand I eagerly explored the country and never came across a New Zealand book similar to the one I had written for the Rockies. As someone exploring and learning about the country I sought a single book I could use as a reference to learn about all aspects of the natural world, including why the country is so unique and the history of its people (and introduced species) and their impact on the flora and fauna.

Tell us how you went about it and did you learn anything that really surprised you?


I have spent years exploring the country from Cape Reinga down to Stewart Island.

On my adventures I absorbed all the information I could. Coming from the United States of America, I was under the mistaken impression that New Zealand was a green paradise. Thus, I was surprised to learn about the heavy impact that people have had on the country. I was also shocked to learn about some of the lesser known native species such as banded kokopu that can climb up waterfalls and the four tiny native frogs that don't croak or have a tadpole stage.

You're from the US, what do you find fascinating about NZ's natural environment?

I find all aspects of the natural environment of New Zealand fascinating from the wild beaches to lush bush, and rocky volcanoes to heaps of rivers and waterfalls. It's taken me some time, but now I truly enjoy the





native broadleaf/podocarp bush. The bush is just so lush with vegetation, creeks and cascades, fungi and invertebrates, and heaps of birds.

What do you hope readers will take away from the book?

I want readers to understand and see the real New Zealand - both the good and the bad. The country is full of unique species that can't be found anywhere else in the world. These are the species that make the country special. Sadly, people have had a serious impact on the natural world of the country, putting many of those unique species at risk and threatening what it is that makes New Zealand New Zealand. As G.I. Joe said, knowing is half the

battle. The next step is to do something about it and make sure that we keep those special species that make New Zealand unique.



Making childcare more affordable for Taranaki families

For many working families here in Ōākura, childcare is one of the biggest household costs. That's why, as part of our Government's work to support New Zealanders with the cost of living, we're making childcare more affordable for low and middle income families.

We recently announced that we're significantly expanding childcare assistance, cutting costs for working parents and supporting more children into early education. On top of this, we're further boosting Working for Families and the Best Start payment, providing more support to help ease the pressure.

These changes will kick in from 1 April next year. The exact amount families will save on childcare costs will depend on the number of hours you work, the wages you are on, the number of hours of childcare per day and the cost of your early childcare education centre.

An Ōākura family with 2 parents working (80 hours per week) on \$26 per hour, \$108,160 p/y, with 2 children under 5 who will not have been eligible for childcare assistance, now will be eligible for \$252 per week.

An Ōākura family with 2 parents working (80 hours per week) on minimum wage, \$88,192 p/y, with 2 children aged 2 and 4 years, now will be eligible for \$360 per week.

An Ōākura Sole parent working (40 hours per week) on \$26 per hour, \$54,080 p/y, with 2 children aged 2 and 4 years, now will be eligible for \$452 per week.

*Based on the above assumptions needs 9.5 hours of childcare per day and 47.5 hours per week, and not eligible for any subsidy under current settings and eligible for various level subsidy rates under new income thresholds.

Childcare assistance has been neglected for more than a decade, since income thresholds were frozen by National in 2010. I'm really proud that the changes we're making will see thousands of parents given back the choice to do what's best for their family.

These next steps build on the work that our Government has already done to ease cost of living pressures on New Zealanders in the face of global inflation, including our cost of living package which includes half price public transport, fuel tax cut and more.

We're also taking action on supermarkets to make sure Kiwis are paying a fair price at the checkout because we're fed up with supermarkets earning \$1 million a day in excess profits while people are paying a premium for the basics.

At a time when families are feeling the cost-of-living spike, our Government is investing in what matters most. We're now taking the next step to make sure childcare is within reach for parents and that families here in $\bar{O}\bar{a}$ kura have more support to cover other costs.
