Elected members and council workers were shocked and saddened by the sudden passing of NPDC Executive Leadership Team Group Manager Community and Customer Services Teresa Turner.

Teresa was renowned for her caring and compassionate nature, her vibrant fashion sense, her passion for this region, and her love of a glass of wine, and was widely respected and popular with her peers and by Council staff members alike. The thoughts and sympathies of the Kaitake Community Board are with her whanau and her friends following her loss.

On the local scene, a year or so ago the "SLOW DOWN KIDS AROUND" traffic safety sign on the New Plymouth entry into Ōākura 'disappeared', and despite various investigations the 'removed' sign could not be located, and person or persons responsible for its removal could not be identified.

After months of work, and a mountain of correspondence between Õākura School management, NPDC Transportation staff, and Waka Kotahi, new signage was finally approved, funded, prepared, manufactured and erected. It was a long and sometimes frustrating journey, but it was great to achieve a successful outcome and to finally have this signage back in place.

Unbelievably, within the first days of the installation of the signs – signage whose sole purpose is for the safety and protection of vulnerable children on and around our village roads – the sign on the northern side of Ōākura was vandalised, knocked down and damaged, along with a number of other information and road safety signs along the coast.

It is difficult to comprehend the mentally of those who would stoop to this level of mindless behaviour, particularly given the amount of time and effort that went into getting these signs reinstated in the first place and the intent behind them.

One can only hope that anyone who comes across information that can identify the culprits will do the right thing and pass that information on to the appropriate authorities, and that a similar action will be taken for any other anti-social or criminal behaviour that is observed or discovered; be that 'boy racer' activity, graffiti, wilful damage, or any other activities that inevitably result in a downstream cost to the rest of society.

Keep your bin lid closed

You can pick up a free bin latch from any NPDC Service Centre to keep your mixed recycling or landfill bin securely closed. When the truck picks up your bin and tips it upside down the weight of what's inside will force the latch open.

Make sure you have at least 2.3kg of waste in your bin otherwise it won't be heavy enough to force the latch open. If you have less waste in your bin, don't secure the latch when you put your bin out.

Kura - school

Karanga - to call, call out, shout, summon

Kapa haka - a group or groups standing in rows to perform traditional Māori dances, accompanied by sung or chanted words

Rēwena - bread made with potato yeast,

Kaiako - teacher, instructor

Rūma - room

Tamariki - children


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Eric wins big at music competition

Another win for our environment and our economy

Our Government has just taken the next big steps in our plan to meet the climate challenge, as part of our work to protect New Zealand's environment and economy.

In August we announced that we're partnering with BlackRock, one of the world's largest investors in climate infrastructure and clean technology, to launch a \$2 billion fund with the goal of making New Zealand one of the first countries in the world to reach 100% renewable electricity.

This fund will help to accelerate clean energy projects like solar, wind, green hydrogen and battery storage, and attract more investment in New Zealand as a climate leader.

I'm really excited about what this means for Kiwi ingenuity in renewable energy. It shows that our ambitious climate targets have the world's attention – and that they're good for the environment, good for the economy, and will help create highly skilled jobs.

As a Government, we've taken more action on climate change in just the last six years than all other governments combined. We passed the Zero

Carbon Act, made electric cars more affordable and are experiencing one of the highest uptakes of EVs anywhere in the world, and we banned offshore oil and gas exploration to send a clear market signal that our future needs to be renewable, just to name a few examples.

In August, we also announced plans to fast-track solar and wind generation projects that would produce more power than the Clyde Dam – the country's third largest hydro dam – at a fraction of the time, cost and impact on the environment. All of these actions mean that New Zealand is now bending the curve on emissions with climate pollution falling through 2020, 2021 and 2022, with the December 2022 quarter delivering the lowest figure in at least nine years.

Now, we need to keep going. A low-emissions future is achievable for New Zealand, and with a Chris Hipkins Government we're well on our way.

Also known as Te Pō ki Te Ao Marama -The darkness to the illumination of light.

It is a beautiful and cherished addition to the Residential Support base at Taranaki Retreat, and is the taonga/gift that we have (for years!) longed to having available for many supported by the Taranaki Retreat.

The Retreat provides a programme of care and support for individuals and whānau going through difficult times; often when it feels like the world has fallen apart. Our support includes all kinds of activities, groups and workshops. A key element is touching base regularly with a peer support worker.

Those support times require spaces that are peaceful, trauma-informed and safe. Many of us find it very hard to open up about what might be happening for us, and confidential support rooms for coaching and therapeutic work are a crucial part of that.

We are living through difficult times, and our work is under higher demand than ever. We needed more private spaces to work both with individuals and small groups. Cathy's Care Centre provides us with precisely that, along with a much needed additional accessible bathroom and a fantastic reception base, which also serves as a support room.

It's is the **community's** gift **to** the community **by** the community, a provision of aroha for any who need it. The concept of 'gift' and provision is therefore woven into its DNA, and you tangibly feel that as soon as you walk in. You **know** both that it has been provided through compassion, understanding and aroha, and equally that it stands for the awesome kaupapa of bringing light and hope from loss and grief - hence Te Pō ki Te Ao Marama - The darkness to the illumination of light, which represents the work that is already being undertaken in this beautiful new building, and always will be. Aroha mai, aroha atu - love given, love received.

Tracy Malone: "I Love Dogs"

"We have always had dogs when I was growing up in my hometown, Kaitaia. My father was a real animal lover and I've also always felt a connection with animals, and with dogs in particular. It's their companionship, their loyalty and that they are so unconditionally loving."

From Kaitaia, Tracy slowly made her way down from the Far North, moving to Auckland and then to Ōākura, in 1999. In 2003 Tracy adopted her first dog from the SPCA, Henry, a Staffy Cross. She had Henry for 16 years until he passed away in 2019. "He was so much fun that I thought about giving back to the SPCA." Volunteer work has come naturally to Tracy. Her mother and grandmother did volunteer work for many years for the Kaitaia Salvation Army and Hospice. Husband, Mark, is the Fire Chief at the Ōākura Volunteer Fire Brigade.

I began volunteering with the New Plymouth SPCA Centre in 2005 and have maintained a consistent relationship since then in a variety of volunteer roles."

Most Friday afternoons, you can find Tracy at the shelter preparing and feeding the dogs their meals and getting the breakfast ready for the next day. She might be putting out fresh water, playing ball with a dog or cleaning up the yards - on 'Poop Patrol', it's called.

Over the years Tracy's been involved in numerous SPCA fundraising activities. She helps with the annual SPCA pool party that's held at the New Plymouth Aquatic Centre at the end of the season for the outdoor pool. The dogs are the last ones to use the pool before it gets cleaned for the following year. "There isn't the argy-bargy you might expect. The dogs just love it!"

Shortly after Henry died, Tracy organised a quiz night at Butler's Reef in his memory. The Ōākura community was generous with donations for raffles and spot prizes, and over \$1400 was raised for our local SPCA.

Following Henry, Tracy and Mark adopted Bella, an older dog - a 'frosty face'. When Bella died they fostered Scotty, another Staffy Cross.



That turned out to be a 'Foster Fail' as they ended up keeping Scotty and adopting him.

They've fostered several puppies, offering their time and love and an opportunity for the dog to be in a home environment and learn socialisation skills. In exchange the SPCA covers all the costs for the dog while being fostered. "Fostering is rewarding for both you and for the dog. If you're thinking of adopting, it's a good way to try it and see if it's right for you. Puppies are great fun, and also full on."

Their dog, Scotty, is now little more than a year old and still being trained. Tracy and Mark walk him around Ōākura and enjoy talking to other dog owners. They will say that they know the dogs better than the people. A favourite walking route is Tapuae Beach. It's known as a dog beach and the dogs there seem to get on well, but it would also be nice to have a fenced dog park in our area.

Tracy wants to acknowledge her employer, Rachel Hooper at McDonald Real Estate, who allows her the flexibility to attend to any urgent dog needs that might arise. The SPCA is always in need of old towels and blankets, and these can be dropped off to Tracy at the local McDonald Real Estate office (across from the Four Square).

Puanga

Silently, the glistening star of Puanga shines in the night sky like a spotlight, lighting up

Silently, winter settles in.

Silently, the icy morning breeze blows over the tamariki, whānau, and kaiako.

Silently, the lanterns glow in the inky darkness. Silently, I make a wish under the Puanga star. Silently, I stare at Puanga in the infinite sky.

Last term at Ōākura School, we celebrated Puanga by holding a dawn service, which tamariki, staff, and whānau could come to. It began at 6:30 in the morning. The tamariki made lanterns to hold during the ceremony, in which they could put a little light. There was waiata and karakia. The school even supplied delicious kai for breakfast. Some classes wrote poems to celebrate the event and some of these are included in this article.

Matariki has also been celebrated throughout New Zealand recently, which some people mistake for Puanga since they are both star related, but in fact, they are two different things. Firstly, Puanga is not in the Matariki star cluster and arrives earlier than Matariki. Puanga is a single whetu (star). In some places in Aotearoa, you can't see Matariki but you can see Puanga as it rises higher than Matariki. They can both be seen just before dawn.

Puanga represents celebrating the preparation of the mara (garden), and growing and harvesting. Matariki is connected to health and well-being and is often viewed as a sign of good fortune or health to come in the following year.

The Puanga ceremony at our kura was a great event that many tamariki and whānau came to. The service started with everybody gathering in the library car park, before a group of senior students did a karanga to call people onto the field, where we gathered in a circle. Tane Manu from Ngāti Tairi told us about the importance of Puanga in relation to the environment, birds and trees. Some of our students shared some of their writing that they had written with us, our kapa haka group sang our new waiata and we all sang our school song. We then moved back to the senior court and Pohutukawa Centre where we had breakfast. A group of younger students recited a karakia before we ate. Lots of people enjoyed the breakfast and having the opportunity to catch up with friends and family

Overall, Puanga is a great time to celebrate, and everyone had a great time at the dawn service with delicious fried bread, beautiful waiata, and being able to see Puanga. Puanga is a time to reflect on the past, remember loved ones and look forward to the year ahead. > Science Fair Success Each year Ruru students enter the Witt

Taranaki Science Fair. This year for our efforts, perseverance and originality of ideas we received 43 awards. Some of the prize winners shared what their technological development projects were.

Olive and Peyton won first prize for their 'Ultimate Markers' project. "We found out that there are 36000 tonnes of plastic waste created by whiteboard markers each year. We designed a non-toxic, eco-friendly whiteboard marker. We used bamboo for the casing, wool and an edible ink that took some time to perfect."

Kupa scored second place with 'Wairakau', a composting spray designed to break down food waste faster to reduce the impact of carbon emissions when food waste is shipped from Taranaki to Hamilton to be disposed of. 'Wairakau' broke down the compost up to 30% faster.

Hayes and Ryder took out third place and several special awards for creating a dissolvable fishing line. Their research showed that a fishing line takes over 600 years to dissolve, so their aim was to create a product that would dissolve much faster. They used flax fibres to create traces that were strong enough for fishing and were to dissolve within a month, a much more environmentally friendly way

Paige's ideas called 'Small Birds Revenge', aimed to solve the problem of larger birds taking all the food from smaller native species. Paige constructed a bird feeder from wire, steel and wood that can be installed in anyone's garden to encourage increased bird life. Daisy and Talia focused on assisting the elderly with their idea called 'MitLits'. The team knitted specially designed mittens that can be worn whilst reading to prevent joints in the hand from becoming sore due to chilly weather.



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
