## Kaitake Community Board

He mihi ana ki a koutou katoa,

Every one of you will be able to recall when, at some time in your life, you encountered someone that you recognised as having some form of 'disability'. What you may be surprised to learn is that more than 30% of the New Plymouth District population experience the effects from some form of physical limitation. A person with a 'disability' is defined as someone with an impairment that affects them physically, mentally, intellectually, or sensorially. However when people with impairments face barriers in society, it is often society that disables them – not their impairments.

I was fortunate to have the opportunity recently to complete a Disability Awareness Training Workshop with the Taranaki Disabilities Information Centre Trust. This Workshop was a hands-on training course offering insight into life with a disability, how to interact and communicate with people with a disability, and providing insight into the difficulties and challenges that people with disabilities face in their day-to-day lives. The workshop's purpose was to encourage understanding, empathy and insight, and was designed to siphon the barriers that we ourselves create around disability, and to look at how workplaces and environments can better support accessibility and inclusion for those with impairments. One of the key takeaways from this training for me personally was the awareness to view Council services through an accessibility lens.

The New Plymouth District Council has a strategic vision to Provide Equitable Services for All of Our Communities, and the Council's definition of Accessibility to those services is "If something is to be accessible it is easy to reach, enter, get, understand, or be appreciated by anyone in the community. This includes people with physical or cognitive challenges, temporary injuries, seniors, young children and their carers, people with non-English speaking backgrounds, and from a range of cultures".

That definition really broadens the range of the district's population that either currently, or could, experience some form of physical limitation.

As you get older, you may need to plan for frailty or disability and how this will change your lifestyle. While disability is not always a part of ageing, changes to your body and your abilities may mean you require extra support and adaptations to make it easier for you to continue living independently. At the other end of the age scale, the very young, or those looking after those very young, could experience very different accessibility limitations.

The Kaitake Community Board has identified a variety of Council services across our rohe that fail to meet Councils own strategic vision of 'Equitable Services for All of Our Communities'. For example, the Ōkato Swimming Pool is long overdue for an accessibility upgrade, the steps down to Ōākura beach are in no way Age or Disability friendly and the

sand ramp down by the Surf Club is often impassable. The playground areas are difficult to access for elderly, or for caregivers with pushchairs who are supervising children in the playground. Community Parks have limited or no sun shading, sections of footpaths are either missing or difficult to negotiate – This is to name but a few. We will continue to advocate with Council directly, and through the Age & Accessibility Working Party, to have these and any other deficiencies addressed.

As 2023 comes to a close it is timely once again to acknowledge all those largely unsung heroes in our community who put an inordinate amount of time and effort to make this part of the district the wonderful place it is.

To the Staff, Boards of Trustees, and various support volunteers who dedicate themselves to providing services for the education and development of the pupils of the Ōmata, Ōākura and Coastal Taranaki schools – I'm certain the community appreciates all that you do, in often trying and resource stretched conditions.

To the Coaches, Administrators and Committee Members of the many sporting and recreational organisations across our part of the district who continue to support the health and physical well being of our community, carrying out their mahi on a purely voluntary basis, and to our local volunteer fire brigades who provide for our safety and well being and that of our families, and our property also out of a love for their community rather than for monetary gain. The 'staff' of these volunteer organisations are absolutely worthy of recognition and of our appreciation and acknowledgement - particularly given these ongoing difficult and trying times.

And lastly, but by no means least, to the myriad of local businesses, library staff, beach camp staff, Hall custodians, and the members of our community who contribute to maintaining the services, attributes and lifestyle that make this place great.

A huge "THANK YOU!" to each and every one of you.

Finally, on behalf of myself, Teresa Goodin, Renee Hohia, Paul Lobb, and Cr. Anneka Carlson Matthews (your Kaitake Community Board), I wish you, your friends and your whanau a safe, merry and relaxing festive season, and we hope you can spend lots of quality family time enjoying our great local environment over the coming months.

#### 4 May 1934 - 28 October 2023

If were to introduce you to May Mita I would describe her as an inspirational woman with a kind heart. I have had the pleasure of talking with May over the last nine years and prior to that I knew her by face and name. She and her late husband Evan were the proprietor publicans of Butlers Reef Hotel. Those walls hold a lot of stories and people have fond recollections of those years when the Mitas were serving patrons. I would say May was a private person because I asked to share her stories in these pages many times and each time she would politely decline. I respect her for that.

May inspired me by her willingness and ability to live independently after the passing of Evan. She worked tirelessly in her large garden and always had it looking immaculate. Not that long ago she was repainting her fence and deck. She was among a group of older adults that are great examples of 'age is just a number' and to refer to them as old or elderly could be considered condescending. For this I feel fortunate to have insight into this period of her life. May told me all about tangi (funeral) and it sounds like the perfect way to honour someone's life. I was so enamoured by it I said I would go to her tangi when she died only to be told I wouldn't be going because she wasn't having one. May had a private funeral and a community invite was extended to attend a memorial for her at Butlers Reef back bar. It was a time for people to connect with her three sons and their families, people she truly adored and admired.

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## Glyn Church: A Flower Blooming Every Day

"One of my ambitions is to have some flower in bloom and providing colour every single day of the calendar year," says renowned horticulturist Glyn Church who lives in Ōākura. We will have a feature article in the Oakura POST at the beginning of each season with Glyn's suggestions for the rest of us who may also like to follow that notion of a flower each day. He will be telling us which plants will flower for that season.

Glyn studied at Pershore College of Horticulture and the famous Chelsea Physic Garden in London. He and his wife, Gail, came to New Zealand in 1976. On a walk through Pukekura Park back then they spotted a little cottage that appeared empty. They sneaked a peak in the window and talked about how lovely it would be to live in that little house. Glyn was offered a position to be in charge of all the parks in New Plymouth (except Pukekura Park) and came to find out that living in that little cottage came along with the job. The cottage has since become home to Sustainability Taranaki.

Glyn and Gail now live in Ōākura up a long, winding driveway that meanders its way through numerous trees. When they bought the place in 1986 It was a Rhododendron nursery called Woodleigh Nursery. "Rhodos were becoming less popular so we started selling rare plants."

Later this morphed into a hydrangea nursery, but it took the intervention of an American TV celebrity to set that in motion. Glyn was looking for summer colour and Graham Smith, the then Curator of Pukeiti, suggested hydrangeas. "Only problem was they were right out of fashion, that is until Martha Stewart hailed them as 'the plant of the millenium', and suddenly they were the height of fashion worldwide."

In 2011 Glyn and Gail sold the nursery, and the current Woodleigh owners remain the main specialist hydrangea nursery in the country with an extensive range at reasonable prices.

Glyn has written seven books on hydrangeas and trees. They are hard to find these days except in libraries and used book stores.

This brings us to his advice on colour in the garden for the SUMMER SEASON, which happens to be about his very own passion for hydrangeas. "Taranaki has the best blue hydrangeas in the world because of our soil. We've had experts here from France, Belgium. England, USA, Korea, Japan — all are blown away by the colour of our hydrangeas. Hydrangeas don't like to dry out and our summer climate is what they like."

"Plant hydrangeas ideally where they get part shade, part sun and good drainage. Mulch to keep the soil cool and moist. They are easy to prune but don't mind if left alone."

"Our soils are very acid with 'free' aluminium available. It is the high aluminium that makes the flowers more blue or purple. Adding lime or phosphates will lock up the aluminium and help turn them red or pink."

"If you want really good red hydrangeas, grow them in a tub or pot . That way you can control the fertilisers. Planting near a concrete path will also encourage them to go red because of the lime in the concrete."

"White hydrangeas prefer to be in the shade or they burn. The whites stay white until autumn, then change to either green or red."

## Kaitake Community Sports Hub – we are nearly there!

The Kaitake Community Sports Hub rebuild project down at Corbett park has the finish line in sight.

The new accessibility ramp was recently completed thanks to Rodney Martin and his team at Earthworks Taranaki and looks great. The rock, gravel and grasses fit perfectly with the beach environment and the ramp a massive improvement on the unusable and now closed ramp that ran onto the beach.

The upstairs is well underway with Bruce the Builder leading a team of local subbies to rebuild the kitchen, toilet, bar, and lounge areas. The new field lights in storage and ready to go up when the ground hardens sufficiently, leaving just the fit out and patio areas to complete before the community can get in there and enjoy an amazing facility.

**STAGE 1. COMPLETED.** Renovate downstairs. Extensive foundation, earthquake and fire compliance work along with 6 changing rooms and 2 new shower blocks including safe, separate change and showers for women.

**STAGE 2. COMPLETED.** Construct weatherproof skin. New roof, cladding, windows, doors, exterior paint. The building is now weatherproof with a new outdoor veranda on the north end overlooking the river mouth.

**STAGE 3. 70% COMPLETED.** Renovate upstairs. New floor and ceilings completed. New toilets, kitchen and bar area, and wall linings underway.

**STAGE 4. 80% COMPLETED.** New field lights. We have purchased new, modern LED lights, drivers and poles and stored these for summer installation.

**STAGE 5. 60% COMPLETED.** Fit out and ground works. Storm water and access ramp are completed, tables, chairs and kitchen appliances



have been purchased, leaving carpet and vinyl flooring, new patio, and security system still to do.

Thanks to a variety of grants, massive community support and the generosity of local trades and businesses, we have raised over \$1m to get this far. All contributions will be recognised on the Foundation Membership boards to go up in the new clubrooms and your name will forever be celebrated for supporting this key community project.

We still need more funding to complete the final fit out details so if you can, please join all our other community members that have supported this project. 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
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## **Oakura Phamacy**

Walking around the village over the past sunny weeks it's noticeable that the pleasant smell of nature's blossoms is quickly being replaced by the delicious aroma of BBQs sparking up. There's nothing like scraping off the fat from March 2023 and chasing the spiders out of the burners to summon the warmer weather, but there is one last trick to perform before you are truly ready to cook into the long balmy evenings - the gas leak check.

This is very easy to do yourself, simply turn on your gas (and keep the burners on to burn off the gas flowing through), squirt or even brush on a mixture of dishwashing liquid and water to each of the fittings along the gas hose - if it bubbles you have a leak. The leak is usually fixed by tightening the connection - no bubbles no troubles!

Let's not embarrass ourselves this summer by letting off gas in front of your guests, tighten up your leaky hoses.

Dominique's seductive vocal is backed by Bernie's lively gypsy guitar; Malcolm on double bass adds sassy toe-tapping rhythms; Helen creates vibrant flurries on her violin whilst Aaron's piano accordion provides that distinctive French Café feel.

With a repertoire stretching from France eastwards, they play well-loved gypsy swing classics from the French Chanson, blending in elements of Roma music and the unmistakable catchy beats of Charles Trenet, heart felt songs from Edith Piaf, and laid back melodies of Django Reinhardt amongst others. Their experience is extensive and they have featured in festivals and headline performances at venues in Taranaki, Hamilton, Whanganui and the South Island.

#### The formation of the Group

Aaron and Bernie met at the Taranaki Swiss Club and have been playing together Swiss/ German folk music for some years. Malcolm joined them after meeting Aaron through the SingerSongwriters to bring a more jazzy style of music. The trio then looked for a singer to join the band. It was Malcolm who approached Dominique and when an instrumentalist was required, it was Dominique who introduced Helen to the group. Now La Mer was ready for anything.

#### Malcolm Alder

Words and music are indeed lifelong passions of Malcolm Alder. A career as an English teacher saw him finding magic in language whilst the double bass became his expressive force, firstly through Blues music and then onto Jazz. From New Zealand's lively stages to distant shores, Malcolm's seasoned talent graced diverse bands, captivating audiences with his remarkable skill. Drawing from a wealth of experience, Malcolm's jazz- based style effortlessly melds with the style of La Mer. Malcolm weaves intricate basslines that guarantee to get toes tapping.

#### Dominique Blatti

Born and raised in the French part of Switzerland, Dominique started learning the

classical guitar at aged 9yrs. She attended the Music Conservatory of Geneva briefly before emigrating to NZ with her parents at 18 years of age. Dominique has been teaching and performing classical guitar full-time for over 20 years. She founded and conducted a variety of guitar ensembles, and has enjoyed performing in several collaborations, including string quartet, duets with flute, cello, recorder, violin, voice and guitar. She is the founder of the Taranaki Classical Guitar Summer Schoolwith the next event taking place 15-20 January - check website www.taranakisummerschool. com for all details. She is the co-founder and co-director of the NCMA Classical Guitar Festival. Although she can sometimes be seen picking up her guitar in the band, Dominique adds classy authenticity with her French vocals.

In October La Mer hired a van and headed to the South Island to take part in the Akaroa French Festival. They performed on board the ferry both ways to pay for the crossings with a great scheme called 'Bands On Board' offered by the Interislander. On their way back to Picton, La Mer toured and played in Christchurch, Kaikoura, Blenheim, Takaka (in the renown Mussel Inn), Nelson, then finally Moutere, in the oldest pub of NZ, the Moutere Inn. "It was a wonderful experience and an absolute blast! We've laughed A LOT, travelled A LOT, squeezed A LOT of gigs into a week at some fantastic venues, met A LOT of new people and made A LOT of great memories", says Dominique.

At this years Garden Festival La Mer had two garden performances, in Hawera and Lepperton, under perfect blue sky and bright sunshine to appreciative audiences.
