Seven students from various Taranaki high schools enrolled in the WITT Build a Bridge programme were lucky enough to be part of the construction of the new Whenu Ariki bridge. In partnership with NPDC and Southcoast Construction the students built the two ramps and handrails at both ends of the new bridge.

WITT has been delivering the Build a Bridge programme for five years. High school students attend classes once a week for three terms to learn about the civil infrastructure sector. During their time at WITT students get to build various structures for their communities with the support of NPDC and local contractors. Being involved in the Whenu Ariki bridge build provided the students with the opportunity to see just how many different groups are involved in such a project, as well as getting to work in such a beautiful location. The ramps were prefabricated at WITT and then transported to site. The students enjoyed spending a few days on site helping with the installation of the ramps and getting to work alongside the contractors.

Some things to note:

Te Ara Tahuri Hau walkway, Whenu Ariki bridge and Hauranga Pā


The height of the bridge has been raised significantly compared with the old bridge, to protect it from high tides, floods and extreme weather events. The height of the pathway was kept lower to minimise visual impact and lower the construction cost; with the expectation that during storms and king tides, waves might overtop the pathway. Users will see the warning notice at each end of the pathway "Caution in big seas".

Te Ara Tahuri Hau Walkway (Path of Wind changes) - translated

The changing winds can be seen as people slowly gaining understanding and finding common ground, like calmer waves meeting at the shore. The word 'Hau' connects the main winds from the sea to Hauranga, acknowledging the importance of the site and holding firm to our beliefs as Ngā Mahanga a Tairi in respecting and protecting this place.

Whenu Ariki Stream Bridge - refers to this stream connecting (Whenu) two high ranking ancestors (Ariki) together.

Daisy's legacy is one of service, courage, and action. He has left an indelible mark on our club and the wider community, and we are all better for having known him. Rest easy, Daisy.

Healing is not just physical; it's emotional, spiritual and cultural.

Olive's Branch Rongoā and Welsh Healing Clinic is set in Ōākura, and offers healing in ancestral wisdom, spirit-led practices and deep connection to Wairua (Spirit) and Whenua (land).

I was born in Wales and was from the age of four taught by my grandmother the traditional understanding of plant medicine, connection to spirit, land and healing. I learnt that healing is not just physical; it's emotional, spiritual and cultural and all must be brought into balance and alignment for healing to occur, bringing peace to the physical symptoms we experience that often some other medicines can find difficult to shift, both mentally and emotionally.

After coming to Aotearoa in 2001, I was taught Rongoā Māori by my then mother-in- law, Kuia Olive Bullock, and her sister, Aunty Sue Jones, where my knowledge and understanding of plant medicine and Wairua was enhanced every day for six years.

Today, Olive's Branch Rongoā clinic brings together traditional healing that includes, mirimiri/romiromi (light and deep tissue massage), honohono (energetic alignment and spirit guidance), and Rongoā Rākau (the use of native and herbal medicine to restore wellbeing).

My practice weaves together the ancient threads of Welsh and Māori traditions, supporting people to reconnect, release and restore health.

I offer release for people of all ages who may be experiencing chronic illnesses, musculoskeletal injuries, arthritis, or want pregnancy support. I use a range of health knowledge such as craniosacral treatments, and haemata (accupressure).

I was the Kaimirimiri (massage and healing person) for the local Kaitake Rugby Team for the past three years, supporting the team with their physical injuries on and off the field. I teach in a few local schools, passing on the ancient medicines that help whanau and support guardianship of the land, as well as seeing clients one-to- one in my clinc based at No4 Butlers Lane.

In 1951 the Smith family purchased the black cottage at 26 Tasman Parade. After 74 years, it's changing hands. The cottage has been a wonderful and much-loved family asset, always maintained as a seaside bach. Now it is the end of an era, the close of a significant chapter in the lives of three generations of the family.

The cottage has an interesting history. It was owned by two nuns in 1935 when the late Norton Moller, aged about five and suffering from consumption-like symtoms, spent his winter there on doctor's orders. The fresh sea air was considered the ideal cure for him.

Later the nuns sold it to a Dr Yagoosh from New Plymouth, who in turn sold it to the Smiths in 1951. Back then, Tasman Parade was a rarely metalled track, and the circle was a lupin-infested paddock. All the cottages there were on the Shearer farm with owners paying only a small annual rental. Arthur Smith set about rectifying that. He arranged for the land to be surveyed into sections so that the owners could purchase titles from the Shearers. At a later date the bach owners donated the grass space in the circle to the Taranaki County Council for a public reserve.

The Smiths spent many happy summers at the cottage while their children - Jan, Joy and Peta - were growing up. It was often said that the £350 outlay was the best money the family ever spent

In 1970 Peta and Doug Hislop moved in soon after they married. Doug, a mad-keen surfer, turned the garage into a backyard surfboard factory, shaping many boards for other surfers.

When Peta and Doug moved to their home in Mace Terrace the cottage became the seaside bach again, welcoming a wider group as the next generation began arriving. All the grandchildren, spread far and wide, came for many years to have fun-filled beach holidays.

When Arthur retired and he and his wife Nan sold up in Hawera and moved to the cottage permanently for the rest of their lives. In 1991 Matt's mother Jan moved in and lived there until her death in 2021, after which Matt and his wife Jan took up residence.

Through Norton's recollection the cottage's history can be traced back back for at least 90 years, and it's likely it stood in that spot in the circle even longer. Now, as Matt and Jan prepare to move on, it's clear the greatest legacy left by Arthur and Nan are the happy memories shared by so many over so many years.

Taking Over Parliament Experiencing The Halls of Power as a Youth MP by Jasper Rhodes.

Parliament isn't a place you'd expect teenagers to run. But for three busy days, that's exactly what happened. I recently took over the Halls of Power alongside 122 other young leaders from around the country. We participated in a 'mock parliament', if you will—but one with a purpose far beyond political education.

Youth Parliament is a triannual programme that supports and develops New Zealand's future leaders and politicians. Though this three-day event is the highlight, my role spans most of the year. It is such a rare opportunity to represent my peers, my school, and the young people of the New Plymouth Electorate at a national level, and have our voices heard. In the debating chamber, I had the privilege of taking the seat of my selecting MP, mentor and friend, David MacLeod.

If you've heard anything about New Zealand's Youth Parliament recently, chances are the word 'censorship' has appeared. For much of the event, the House was divided. One side claimed that the Ministry of Youth Development censored their speeches; the other side thought differently. Adult politics is brutal, but Youth Parliament came very close to this brutality, and in many cases overtook it. In my opinion, this conflict diluted a key purpose of the event: to excite young people about politics. I fear this division scared many of us away from it.



Amidst the drama, positive experiences and outcomes were had. I had the privilege of co-chairing my Parliamentary Working Group on online safety, which is like a select committee. The mutual respect we had for each other proved that unity did exist at Youth Parliament, despite what was often portrayed in the media. Eleven of us worked together towards solutions on how our generation can be better protected from the threats of the online world. We presented our recommendations to MPs, and senior officials of departments, including the Ministry of Justice and the Department of Internal Affairs.

The voices of young people are too often neglected when making decisions that affect them. But the recommendations we provided will be used by the Government to actually influence policies and decisions.

These three days were a true taster of politics. We debated, networked, had media interviews, and worked until midnight on our proposals to Government. A challenge, yes, but above all, an honour and a thrill.

It was admittedly a powerful feeling sitting in a room with the country's current leaders, and many of its future ones. It is this generation that will one day lead Aotearoa, and, if the last week is anything to go by, I'd say the future is in pretty safe hands.

Stories of the Past

As shared by Len Jury

Bird of the week.

As a youngster I collected birds' eggs, as youngsters did in those late days of the 1940s. These were easily accessible in hedges around the farm but painful as you worked your bare arm towards the nest. Sleeves catching on the thorns of the boxthorn hedge did not help the mission. Your bare arm as you wriggled it into the hedge sometimes startled the poor old sitting mum. In those days thrushes and blackbirds were, as now, plentiful. It was an acquired skill not only robbing the nest but avoiding the inevitable scratches which turned septic and painful. Next was the "blowing" of the eggs, removing the yoke without breaking the shell, again another but delicate acquired skill. The eggs were threaded onto a cotton to show to admiring visitors.

Then, from the city (Lower Hutt) came cousins who took exception to my prowess. I could not understand their displeasure. I was not depleting numbers as it was easy to see the usual numbers were growing. However, my excitement of achievement waned and soon stopped. I would be devastated if such a practice was indulged today. My interest has turned to recognising different bird species around our home, our farm of the past and in our small locality.

Firstly, the flocks of starlings making so much noise in the local mainly macrocarpa trees, a cacophony that could be easily heard half a kilometre, perhaps a kilometre, away. Not only was their presence easily heard, there was also the scene of the filth splattered on the ground left behind after a night roosting. Another disgusting habit was their disease-ridden pollution of water troughs. Then the annoying habit of building nests in sheds, even above ceilings. They snuck through little holes, ever so small, to build nests. The chicks as they grew were forever clamouring louder and louder with their food demands, like spoilt children. I have no time at all for starlings as I view them as disease ridden pests that spread salmonella, campylobacter, E. coli and other diseases that can affect the health of humans, livestock and pets. Just google "Starlings" to understand the evil picture. However, there is nothing evil about Fay Looney's great photo of a murmuration of starlings in flight on the cover of June issue of "TOP" (The Ōākura Post). That is a memorable work of art.

I have always been interested in the "Garden Birds of the week" to survey. In your garden or seen from your home, there are a surprising number of different species. I note a number, and I am sure you will nod your head as you recognise your friends. Let's start with the Blackbirds. Blackbirds as they spy an emerging worm and inch it from the ground is a fascinating exercise to watch. Similarly, a Kingfisher perched on a powerline many metres above the ground dives downwards onto an unsuspecting beetle. Goldfinches (their young look like a sparrow). Greenfinch, Fantail, Native Pigeons, Pheasants, Pukeko, Quail, Mynas, Magpies, Sky Larks, Rosellas, Tui, Domestic fowl and Bantams, Pigeons, Sparrows, Hedge Sparrows, Starlings, Swallows, Yellow Hammers, Waxeyes, Paradise ducks, Geese, Seagulls, Mollymawks, Spur wing Plover, Kingfisher, Chaffinch, Skylark, Harrier Hawks, New Zealand Falcon, Teal and Mallard ducks and the little black rubber duckies, Scaupe, like a child's toy, dives and then shoots to the surface within seconds.

Then the moreporks with their distinctive calls at night. I have only seen morepork once and it was a VERY scary encounter. A pair was sitting on a branch above, their big black, outsize eyes swivelling as they watched my cousin and me below. It was an unnerving concentrated stare. We did not stay to watch but a quick exit back to the paddock above deemed a very wise thing to do. Even a Bittern I have once seen in a creek standing with its outstretched beak in the air like a leaf of a reed, except it was different. It immediately flew away, and I have never seen one since.

I am sure you can add others to this list.

Each species has a special trait, particularly to the many who enjoy watching our birdlife. The bird I admire is the spur-winged plover. Whenever a hawk appeared the plover pair would immediately engage slashing with their wingtips as they rolled to attack time and time again. Unfortunately, horses and sheep do not leave the taller patches of grass for them to take turns to nest.

A visitor from Singapore was enthralled to look down upon Hawks as they flew past, rolled, glided, soared and dived using the airwaves as part of their daily patrols for prey. These patrols follow the same pattern day after day until a kill is made. For a few days they will fly just over the same spot, I guess to catch another there, a rather fruitless exercise.

Not fruitless when they attack a baby rabbit that hunches down in the paddock instead of speeding for cover. It's a prime example of 'I can't see therefore I can't be seen'.

There are birds not in the garden and recognised as not special to New Zealanders. Illustrated is a notice printed on cotton 90 years ago reiterating a Conservation Act of 1922.

I regret to say when I was not even a teenager, I was aware of a neighbour trapping 'possums in the ranges and bringing back kiwi that had been caught by the leg in a trap. He assisted their recuperation, but I know there were some released with a stump of one leg. After visiting friends at Uruti in Young Farmer days and hearing kiwis, my memory of the same bird calls at night was clear. I still feel sickened.

A few decades ago, as the President of an international organisation with members in over 50 countries, one of my roles was to visit their conventions around the world. In Asia they particularly took great pride and beaming smiles to recognise me as" Kiwi". I was only the second President outside of North America in over 60 years from the foundation of the organisation. At these conventions not only was the New Zealand flag honoured but it was also introduced, with no prompting from me, as the "Kiwi" flag.

Another instance I find particularly tragic involved family members in the late 1800s. A family letter was sent from the wife of the head lighthouse keeper at a very isolated lighthouse in Fiordland recording how the Government supply boat had not brought food supplies "for a year" due to the weather and sea conditions. The writer also records how it was no problem as there were plentiful numbers of kiwi and other native birds I will not name, and vegetables for their food. Yes, mention was also made of the hordes of mosquitos.

Today I am proud of the efforts of our farmers and other property owners in Ōmata, Koru and Ōākura, from the ranges to the sea, encouraging native bird numbers. They have each fenced covenants, which remain in perpetuity, with the assistance and encouragement from the Department of Conservation, New Plymouth District Council and the Taranaki Regional Council. These areas of native bush and wetlands will not only benefit our native birds, flora and vegetation, but our own future generations. These areas now form a corridor for birds to follow to feed as the seasons change.

I must commend our schools for their efforts to identify our native birds and trees and plant these and native vegetation as part of the studies of their pupils' education.

PROTECTION OF NATIVE BIRDS

THE public are earnestly requested to assist in

preserving for posterity the Native Birds of New Zealand.

Under the Animals Protection and Game Act,

Under the Animals Protection and Game Act, 1921-22, it is illegal for any person to take or kill any protected birds or have in possession the skins or eggs of any such birds without the consent of the Minister of Internal Affairs.

Practically the whole of the Native Birds of the Dominion are absolutely protected, with the exception of a few birds classed as Native Game, which may only be taken when authorized during an open season.

The Animals Protection and Game Act, 1921-22, further makes it illegal for any person to rob or destroy the nest of any protected bird or any game bird.

Every person who offends against the above provisions is liable to a fine of £25 for every such offence.

The names of absolutely protected birds can be obtained at Money-order Offices and Police-stations,
